Citrus fruits are something of which fast every morning (one egg a do secretarial work, and wash she's seen little in her five years in Britain. She had changed into a bright blue San Francisco-bought jumper and striped blouse.

"We're allowed to get out of uniform on week ends and holidays, but of course, with rationing we can't have many cloths. We have to have coupons for our uniforms, too, and they can't be spent for anything else."

Eyes on Hopper's Hat

She said she was amazed at San Francisco's flower-garden hats (when we lunched with her at the informal party Mrs. Drew Childster gave in Sissel's honor at the St. Francis, she couldn't take her eyes off them—especially Hedda Hopper's ribbon concoction.)

In England our clothes are strictly utilitarian, she told us—a shade of brown hair is frequently noticed.

We went to call on Sissel in her sunny Fairmont Hotel room and found her munching delightedly one of a huge bagful of oranges.

month in England, you know) and meat every day. In England the ration is equal to one lamb chop a week.

"We're lucky," she says. "At home in Norway they get meat only every six months."

Feminine Draft

Sissel joined the Norwegian army auxiliary as soon as she was graduated from an English high school in 1942. She was a member of one of the first three classes which were voluntary and which were conducted by men officers. Now all Norwegian women in England are required either to join one of the three auxiliaries—Army, Navy or Air Force—or work in a government office.

"There just aren't enough Norwegian girls to do the work that's to be done. Our commanding officers are hard put to decide how to spread the supply among the demand," she said. Mainly the girls do secretarial work, and wash homely arts as cooking, sewing and sewing for the Norwegian troops.


The shortage of Norwegian women in England has had another result—although the Norwegian girls marry their own countrymen, the Norwegian men are marrying British girls.

The Day Is Coming

Sissel went to the British WAC officers' school and is now a second lieutenant—one of the 18 feminine officers in the Norwegian group, she's waiting breathlessly for the news that the Norwegians can return to their homeland—for when the army moves, the women's auxiliary won't be far behind.

After her war duties are done, Sissel—who is a Norwegian Air Force flyer's widow—hopes to go to the University of Oslo and study languages. English will be her major subject (in Norway they take only three subjects at the university) and French and history her other two.

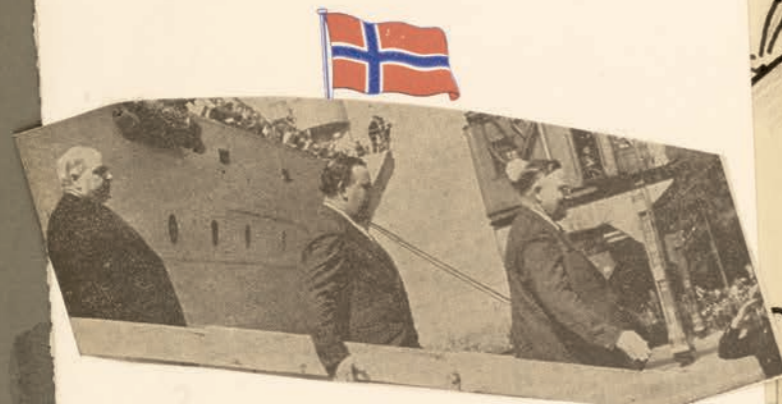

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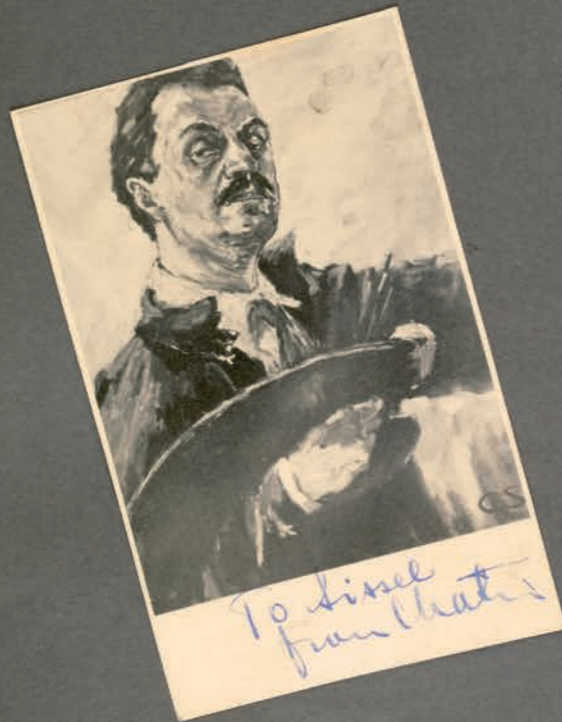

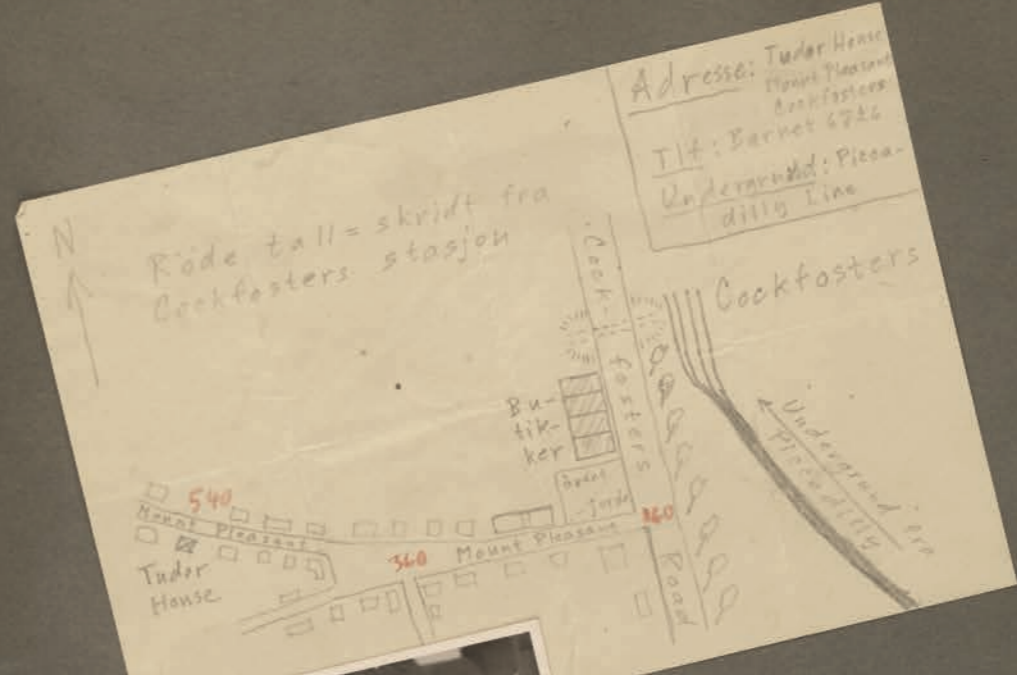

A COMMUNITY OF NATIONS PLANS FOR A LASTING PEACE AFTER VICTORY

THE BANKRUPTCY OF NEUTRALITY

By Hr. Trygve Lie, Foreign Minister of Norway

Intimate international cooperation will be needed after the war in the political, military, and economic fields. Norway has no frontier problems, and no desire for territorial expansion. But the Norwegian people have been convinced that the policy of neutrality is bankrupt. The first question is with whom shall we cooperate?

Happily our strategic position, our economic interests, our ideals, and our "way of life" all point in the same direction. There has not been the conflict between ideological and strategic considerations which has shown itself in the practical results. We have all discussed the reasons why the League of Nations did not succeed in carrying out the tasks assigned to it. It would have been possible to use the League machinery against Italian and German aggression if the leading Powers in the League had seriously wanted to do so. Countries adopted, however, a shortsighted policy of self-interest, and in an atmosphere of pacific public opinion nobody was willing to run any risks. This produced an inevitable disillusionment and a critical attitude towards the idea of a community of nations.

PLANNED ECONOMY

It is therefore essential that the new international cooperation should be built upon firm and safe ground. Since we are at war it would be natural to start with military collaboration. After the war the allied countries will have important many readers for the important courageous article by the Norwegian Foreign Minister in last Friday's issue, and for your editorial comment?

His article appeared with the news of the revision of the United States Neutrality Act. The conclusion is obvious. Throughout the world "the policy of neutrality" is, in Hr. Lie's words, "bankrupt." That is the starting point of Hr. Lie's argument, and it is the supreme lesson of the past. As he says, the League of Nations could have been used against the Italian and German aggression; the uprising of world opinion over Abyssinia showed that the peoples would have supported any action their Governments proposed; the risks would have been negligible compared with the risks and the cost of the present war. But, unhappily, at decisive moments the leading Powers, and particularly Great Britain and France, threw over their Covewant and reverted to a policy of neutrality between the aggressor and his victims.

Unless the nations recognize with Hr. Lie that this was the fatal error, that there can be no both immoral and suicidal, there can be no hope of peace. Only on this foundation can there be the "intimate international cooperation" which he rightly says will be needed in the political, military, and economic fields. I submit that past experience also shows that Hr. Lie is right about the methods by which this cooperation can be obtained. It will be impossible to separate political from economic matters, or political from military; they are all part of one problem. That problem cannot be dealt with in regional compartments; the help and cooperation of all the continents will be required.

That will be most obvious in the urgent economic questions with which we shall be faced in the future.

natural to think of the defence of the Atlantic and strongly to emphasize our desire to see the United States participating in this task. Military and political questions being closely connected, we must also work together in the political tasks which will have to be tackled after the war; not least in connexion with the peace settlement. The inter-allied conferences which have taken place recently have created the beginnings of a common political machinery. They might perhaps be developed into a real Inter-Allied Committee holding regular meetings and having, so far as possible, executive powers, to make it possible to start the wheels turning again. This second task should be carried out accordingly, so far as possible, can restart the economic activity most suited to it. Thus a step will have been taken towards an international planned economy, and afterwards will come the regulation of markets and common plans for opening up new markets. Here is a much more important matter than the access to raw materials of which so much has been heard.

In Norway we have our special task within the planned economy of the future. Norwegian shipping has never received subsidies in any form; it has, on the contrary, been heavily taxed. If, nevertheless, it has been able to maintain a prominent place in the face of severe competition, that is entirely due to its high quality in leadership, crews, and equipment. In the United States groups of able and representative men are already at work studying the means by which, internally, full production can be maintained and unemployment reduced to a minimum after the war and, internationally, how the present cooperation between the United States, Great Britain, and the

Equally unscrupulous is the movement to tackle the problems of world employment, world production, and world trade in the same positive, constructive, and cooperative spirit. It will be warmly welcomed and strongly supported in this country, where as a matter of fact a good deal of spade work has already been done in a quiet way with the object of building up what may be called a world trade alliance to organize the exchange of goods on cooperative instead of narrowly competitive lines.

The recent article of Hr. LIE, the Norwegian Foreign Minister, foreshadows the response of the Allied nations to this positive approach. People working on these problems in the United States, in Great Britain, and in the other Western European countries, in Soviet Russia, and in the British Commonwealth may not see eye to eye on all the questions which will arise. They will, necessarily, regard them from different angles. In the United States particular emphasis is laid on the abolition of trade restrictions, discriminations, and preferences. It is an ideal which most people in this country will gladly accept, but its complete realization will only be made possible by the removal of the causes which brought these barriers into being. Most of them have been erected not out of wanton ill-will or a passion for self-sufficiency, but because they seemed the only practicable means in the prevailing chaos of maintaining a decent standard of life and preventing widespread unemployment. They will disappear of themselves or become comparatively unimportant in a world in which every one cooperates to raise the levels of consumption, to maintain production at stable price levels, and to promote the freest possible exchange of national surpluses.

FOUNDATIONS OF PEACE

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES

Sir.—The very valuable and most timely article by the Foreign Minister of Norway, planning the future community of nations on a basis of politics and economics, might, I venture to think, have laid more stress upon the third essential foundation of a lasting peace. Discussing why the League of Nations did not succeed in carrying out the tasks assigned to it, Hr. Countries adopted, however, a shortsighted policy of self-interest." That a short-sighted policy of self-interest will happen again unless the community of nations is gradually built up in the minds and hearts of men. Peace depends partly upon education.

The Versailles settlement dealt almost exclusively with politics, paying little attention to economics. The Atlantic Charter is welcome evidence that this mistake will not be repeated. But we shall not ensure a lasting peace unless to our political planning for security and our economic planning for prosperity we add psychological planning for unity.
